A vision of hope

Awake, O sleeper, and arise from the dead, and Christ will shine on you.

Everywhere we look in the world today we seem to see and hear about evidences of bad news. strife, inequity, crime, poverty, racism, deception, discrimination, oppression, anger, hate, alienation, depression, famine, climate change, disease and death. The list goes on and on. Many thoughtul and caring people are striving earnestly in various ways to solve these and other problems like them. Certainly there are bright rays of encouragement and hope in the midst of it all, but darkness seems to be closing in. Various theories have been put forward about the underlying dynamics of the critical problems we're facing, is there one unifying theme behind them all that can help us work toward solving them together?

During this season we remember a man named lesus who was born of loving but poor parents into a society dominated by a partially enlightened but oppressive and colonialist government that discriminated against people like him. He was raised in a small town where everyone knew that he had been conceived before his parents were married. After honorably completing an education common to children in his community he joined his father's carpentry business and remained unmarried well into adulthood.

By the time he had turned 30 people were beginning to wonder what was to become of this dedicated man when, apparently under the influence of his cousin John, his life went through a dramatic transformation. After submitting to John's baptism he changed from a quiet hometown man into an impassioned itinerant preacher who brought a message of good news to a darkened world of God's mertful love, rule, and reign. He proclaimed forgiveness of sin, hope for the future, peace to the troubled, freedom and justice to the captives, wisdom to the searching, and hearing and sight to the deaf and blind. His message was and remains as simple now as it was when the walked this carth:
